FOREWORD:





Sh Ajay Choudhary, IPS Special Commissioner / TMD (Zone II)

In the wake of the rising pollution levels in Delhi- NCR, it is our sacred duty to safeguard the environment. Delhi Traffic Police, an important stakeholder, is committed to implement the directions issued by Hon'ble Supreme Court of India, Commission for Air Quality Management and other regulatory authorities. Thousands of personnel of Delhi Traffic Police are out on the streets day and night, braving the atmospheric toxicity, to implement these directions and to ensure speedy return of normalcy.

Our aim is to protect the citizens on road and off the road so that they breathe in a better environment.

The enforcement drives include diversion of non-destined goods vehicles from border entry points; impounding of 10/15 years diesel/petrol vehicles and prosecutions with fines for violation of PUCC norms; transportation of C & D materials without proper covers; not plying in designated lanes; improper parking; driving against the flow; and violation of No Entry timings.

To curb further deterioration of air pollution which would be fatal for all of us, GRAP 4 or Graded Response Action Plan has been imposed in Delhi- NCR. This is an emergency measure to ensure that vehicles with higher emissions are stopped from plying. As per this rule, only electric, CNG, diesel vehicles falling in BS6 emission category and petrol vehicles of BS4 and above are allowed to ply in Delhi until further orders.

Since 15 October, more than 1,63,079 vehicles were prosecuted for pollution norms violations. The citizenry has to be proactive by voluntarily complying with the rules and provisions. To safeguard the environment we need equal partnership and in fact a graded response of the citizens.

I hereby reiterate that Delhi is not only the National Capital and pride of the country, it is home for us all. I urge the citizens to please co-operate and co-opt this drive against pollution and help Delhi traffic police in its endeavour to protect the environment.

Please join hands with us to ensure that this beautiful home of ours remains in pristine condition so that all of us, specially our children and senior citizens, can breathe with smiles.

At the same juncture I want to assure you that all our ranks are, and will be. on the streets to ensure a better environment and safe roads for everyone.

DELHI ROAD CRASH REPORT RELEASE



- Commissioner of Police, Delhi, Sh Sanjay Arora, IPS, released the Delhi Road
 Crash Report 2023 prepared by Delhi Traffic Unit.
- This annual report analyses the accidents of 2023 with causes, patterns and gives suggestions on road designs, regulation and prosecution.
- Road Safety Action Plan is updated based on this report involving multiple departments to improve education, engineering, enforcement and emergency care.
- The report has identified pedestrians and two wheelers as most vulnerable categories with 43 and 38 per cent fatalities respectively in 2023.
- Delhi Traffic Police has identified 10 black spots including ISBT Kashmere Gate Chowk, Burari Chowk, Britannia Chowk, Bhalswa Chowk, Wazirpur Depot, R/A Mori Gate, Gandhi Vihar Bus Stand.
- Number of road prosecutions increased from 4,38,052 in 2022 to 6,39,097 in 2023, even as crashes decreased from 1264 in 2022 to 1257 in 2023 despite huge increase in numbers of vehicles on roads during this period.
 - "The efforts of Delhi Traffic Police have led to a total reduction of road crash deaths in Delhi by 20 per cent over the last decade. Continuing our endeavour to save lives we have now increased focus on more pedestrian centric traffic management", said Ajay Chaudhary, IPS, Special Commissioner, Traffic, Delhi.





DELHI TRAFFIC POLICE KIOSK AT TRADE FAIR




Delhi Traffic Police launched an Awareness Kiosk at Stall 14 of India International Trade Fair to promote Road safety.



Live demonstrations were given on how red light jumping and speed violations are captured by high-definition cameras, how challans are generated.




The objective was to raise awareness among visitors about importance of adhering to traffic rules.




YOGA TO BEAT POLLUTION



Delhi Traffic Police Organizes Yoga session for its personnel





- Delhi Traffic Police organised yoga session on 21.11.24 to promote health and well being of its personnel under supervision of Spl CP

- adverse effects of pollution.
- Since most traffic personnel work long hours standing outdoors exposed to pollution and inclement weather, many develop cervical, asthma, back pain, stiffness, stress disorders etc.
- To manage these health issues expert yoga instructors advised and demonstrated yogasanas like Kapalbhati, Nadisodhana, Sitali
- Pranayam, Dhyana, Bhramari Pranayam, Tadasana, Vrikshasana, Stretch exercises for neck, shoulder, knee etc
- Other wellness programs available for traffic personnel
- include regular health check-ups, stress management workshops and awareness sessions on proactive measures against pollution and other lifestyle related disorders and diseases.

- TMD/ Zone II said, "Traffic Police Personnel work tirelessly on the roads, exposed to inclement weather
- conditions and polluted environment. This yoga session is part of our ongoing efforts to address their health issues and



DELHI TRAFFIC WOES

- From a car overturning in front of Kirti Nagar Metro station, to a car catching fire near Rajokri flyover, to road rage, to a ghastly accident with a car crashing into roadside railing at Geeta Colony caused by the driver trying to change songs in his mobile, Delhi Traffic Police tackled it all in the past month of October.
- Apart from the Police, discerning citizens too condemned these avoidable mishaps.
- "Delhi Traffic Police, please be stricter with rule violators. Jumping red light, wrong way driving especially by two wheelers and delivery guys have become rampant", says Manik Chillar, a commuter.
- " Delhi Traffic Police please revoke driving licenses of rule violators without mercy. There is no regard for law, no regard for fellow citizens", says Manish Khurana.
- "Delhi Police should be stricter and put fear of law in minds of these miscreants who flout traffic rules with impunity", says commuter Aditya Anand.

Traffic Police Personnel of the Month

Delhi Traffic Police W/HC Satish Kumari saves life by prompt action

W/HC Satish Kumari, Dwarka Traffic Circle was deployed on traffic route management near AFS Palam Gate. She witnessed an accident at around 7.45 am wherein two bikes collided and one bike rider fell down and lost consciousness.

W/HC Satish Kumari immediately rushed and gave CPR to the injured person, later identified as Sh Amit Dogra, resident of Palam Colony. He regained consciousness due to this CPR.

She also called for the PCR as Dogra had visible injuries. The PCR rushed Dogra to the nearby hospital.

Delhi Traffic Police nabs mobile thief

Delhi Traffic Police at 11 Murti T-Point chased and caught a thief who had stolen a Cluster Bus passenger's mobile phone.

Stolen phone was recovered and identified by the victim.

The accused was handed over to PCR for further action.






Swift Action by Chanakyapuri Traffic Police Leads to stopping a mobile theft.

Delhi traffic police apprehended a mobile thief who fled with a stolen mobile from a moving bus at 11 Murti T-Point & was handed over to PCR for further action.

Encroachment drive

Traffic Police Eastern Range under supervision of Rajeev Kumar, IPS, DCP Eastern & Northern Range, along with MCD and local police, launched special anti encroachment drives at Khajuri Chowk, Anand Vihar ISBT & Seelempur Chowk in Eastern Range and Pitampura in Northern Range.

- Total 205 challans were issued to encroachers including illegal vendors, hawkers and illegally parked vehicles at Anand Vihar ISBT, 42 challans at Khajuri Chowk, and 96 challans at Seelampur Chowk, GT Road. These encroachments had led to narrowing of road space for traffic and pedestrians.
- A total of 893 challans including 284 e-challans, 589 VOCa challans and 20 challans for towed vehicles using cranes, were issued at Netaji Subhash Place, Pitampura.
- Encroachment by putting of articles for sale on either side the road by hawkers, and illegally parked TSR, private buses, Taxis etc had left very little space for commuters and pedestrians leading to heavy congestion on the roads
- Such drives are now being conducted on regular basis to ensure that some of the busiest points of Delhi remain congestion free.

CARING for CYCLISTS



- Cyclists, Pedestrians, E-Rickshaws, two wheelers and riders/ passengers of three wheelers are collectively known as 'Vulnerable Road Users' and account for half the road crash deaths worldwide.
- Road Safety Cell has been regularly organising, 'Cycle Conspicuity Campaign' to raise awareness among these 'Vulnerable Road Users' about how to remain safe. Traffic Police personnel also affix reflective tapes on cycles and Erickshaws to ensure their visibility to other drivers at night. October witnessed campaigns at Narela and Rohtak Road.
- In Delhi, the percentage of cyclists injured in road crashes has reduced gradually in the past 15 years from 5.05 % in 2007 to 2.06 % in 2023.

The vulnerability of cyclist victims in road crashes are higher in Samaypur Badli, Narela, Mehrauli, Badarpur, Delhi Cantt and Sarita Vihar circles.

DELHI TRAFFIC POLICE ADVISORY TO CYCLISTS:

- Use Cycle tracks if there.
- Ride on the left side of the road.
- Keep distance from other vehicles, mainly four wheelers.
- Be extra careful and indicate by hand while changing lanes, especially at crossroads.
- Avoid very busy roads.
- Do not hold on to fast moving vehicles while riding.
- Wear flashy clothes at night. Paint mudguard white.
- Do not hold items in hand or put heavy load on carrier.
- Let other vehicles which have right to passage, pass first.
- Use front light during night time and bad weather.
- Slow down when changing directions. Indicate by hand.

GLIMPSES OF POLICE LIFE

With almost 39 years service in Delhi Police, just retired SI Ramvir Sharma has a repertoire of invaluable anectdotes to share:

He talks of an incident when he alongwith team of 3 personnel went to nab a proclaimed offender at 4 am at Khoda Colony. The police team had to run after the escaping criminal on foot for over 3 km, jumping over walls while the criminal kept throwing knives at the police team.

Another thrilling incident was during his 'Chase & Challan' duty when he followed and successully nabbed an alcohol bootlegger with a Qualis car full of illicit liquor. In this case, the police team had to chase a recklessly driving bootlegger from Gazipur border to IP extension!

A third incident SI Ramvir talks about is when his team arrested a youth who had opened the sunroof of his car, stood out and was dancing to high volume music blared by car speakers. When police tried to stop him, he said he did this all the time in Punjab!











Retired SI Arjun Kumar's 37 years of service in Delhi Police has left him with a long list of unforgettable memories:

These include him and team of 3 getting a reward of Rs 1000/-each from Delhi Police for nabbing an errant filmmaker on Signature Bridge who had stopped traffic and hit many cyclists and TSR autos while filming.

The retired SI feels sad when after standing on toes round the clock and battling pollution, miscreants and rule violators, traffic police has to hear nasty comments like 'why did you leave so and so, and nab me?.He says" We always try to be fair, but we are human. Public has to remember, we are not Spidermen or Supermen."



Vehicle restrictions:

BS-IV vehicles (except essential services), petrol vehicles more than 15 years, diesel vehicles more than 10 years are banned. BS-VI, EVs & CNG vehicles are allowed.



Construction banned:

Construction work fully banned till further order.



Reduced workforce:

50% office capacity recommended; Work-from-home encouraged.



Schools online:

All classes up to 12th are to be conducted in online mode only.



Complete ban on all kinds of firecrackers on manufacturing, storage, selling and bursting in Delhi NCR.

Let's work together to protect Delhi's air and our health.
